THE DOMINICAN FRIARS AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

For 800 years, the Dominican Friars have engaged in debate over contested ideas wherever the faith is challenged. Medieval friars participated in disputations governed by highly formalized rules that often took place before large crowds. Today, in a society wracked by more fundamental divisions, the Dominicans seek to elevate the discourse and find common ground while upholding the truths of the faith and natural reason.

Fr. Boniface Endorf, O.P., recently addressed Ohio lawmakers in support of a proposed bill protecting pastors from officiating at civil unions in violation of their religious convictions. "The issue here is whether an American has the right to believe what all the Founders of this nation believed about marriage and the human condition, or not," Fr. Endorf stated in his testimony.

Fr. Nicanor Austriaco, O.P., professor of biology and bioethics at Providence College,

was called before the Rhode Island House Judiciary Committee to testify against a bill that could roll back regulation of the abortion industry. "You end up having this situation where a woman struggles with the incoherence of what she has done. This bill does not acknowledge that," said Fr. Austriaco, speaking of his experience working with Project Rachel counseling women who regret having an abortion.

Fr. Pius Pietrzyk, O.P., serves as a member of the bipartisan board of the Legal Service Corporation (LSC), which provides civil legal aid to low-income Americans. "In my tenure on the LSC Board, I have tried always to emphasize that the primary goal of LSC is to help the poor-not federal bureaucrats and not ideologues," writes Fr. Pietrzyk in an article calling for continued funding of a successfully restructured LSC.

By supporting friar formation, you ensure that the charism of St. Dominic and the wisdom of St. Thomas continue to act as leaven in our society during these difficult times!

PHILOSOPHY AS IT IS MEANT TO BE DONE: THOMISTIC INSTITUTE HOLDS AQUINAS ON METAPHYSICS CONFERENCE

This summer, the Dominican-run Thomistic Institute, joined by the Notre Dame Center for Ethics and Culture and the Catholic and Dominican Institute, brought together eminent philosophers and graduate students from around the country to discuss "Aquinas on Metaphysics." The three-day workshop was held on the beautiful campus of Mount Saint Mary College overlooking the Hudson River in Newburgh, NY.

Metaphysics is the branch of philosophy in which human reason studies all things that exist, what is common to them, and what-or rather, Who-gives them their existence. Presenters were experts in the thought of Aquinas and the Thomistic tradition, including Dominican House of Studies professor of philosophy Fr. James Brent, O.P.

Each day included Morning Prayer, Mass, three presentations, a discussion panel, and a holy hour with opportunity for confession. 
THE DESERVING POOR **BOYS' PRIESTHOOD ASSOCIATION TURNS 100**

For 100 years, members of the Deserving Poor Boys' Priesthood Association have helped young men answer the call of Jesus Christ to become Dominican priests.

The Association was founded by Fr. Raymond Meagher, O.P., Prior Provincial of the Dominican Province of St. Joseph and cofounder of Providence College. As Fr. Meagher put it, "There is a need of a great army of men in the white habit of St. Dominic, highly educated and apostolic preachers and teachers, whose active life would reflect the traditional contemplative spirit of the Order of Preachers."

Today, with over 70 men in formation, the Province of St. Joseph has the fastest growing men's vocations program in the United States. With the help of generous donors, many of whom learned about the Association in their Dominican parishes, the Deserving Poor Boys' Priesthood Association is answering the call of St. Dominic in the 21st century.



Members make financial gifts as concrete expressions of spiritual dedication, "living stones," set on the foundation laid by St. Dominic to build up a spiritual house capable of offering acceptable sacrifices to God.

In 1928, the Association received official recognition from Pope Pius XI, who granted its members a plenary indulgence, under the usual conditions, to be gained annually and in the hour of death. By joining the Association, members can receive this indulgence and reap the spiritual benefit of masses and prayers offered by the priests of the Province of St. Joseph. Additionally, the faithful departed can be enrolled in the Deserving Poor Boys' Purgatorian Society.
